WMA FOUNDATION ASSISTS RESIDENTS IN NEED

The mission of the WMA Foundation is to enrich the quality of life for all persons living in manufactured home communities in California, who are disadvantaged due to income or circumstance.



The WMA Foundation initiated a fund designed to help residents of land lease communities, who have been struck by fires or other disasters and are in need of immediate financial assistance.

The purpose of the Fund is not to act as a FEMA or other governmental agency, but to answer the need when disaster tries our residents.



This past year we have made several contributions to residents across the state, who were struck by fire.

☪ The Mendoza family in Willits lost their home and belongings due to a fire. WMA Foundation's disaster relief fund contributed \$500 to the family.

☪ A fire destroyed Cynthia Miller's home in Sacramento, and tragically, her two children died in the horrific blaze. The Foundation contributed \$1,000 to assist with her with immediate needs.

☪ Cathy Broyles, and her 29-year-old daughter Tracy Broyles, were inside their three-bedroom home at Mesa Dunes Mobile Home Park in Arroyo Grande with three toddlers, when a fire broke out in their laundry room. The home was a complete loss. The WMA Foundation contributed \$1,000 to assist with immediate needs.
