How to create a Butterfly Garden

First, find out which species thrive in your area and the plants they are drawn to and which ones they lay their eggs on.

Choosing the Right Spot

Butterflies like the sun and large, open areas, so choose a spot that they will thrive in. To provide shelter from the wind, select plants like Buddleia, Honeysuckle, Spice Bush and Hawthorne. A small fence, shrubs, trees or even a large rock provide shelter from the wind.

Since butterflies cannot drink from open water, create little puddles using mud. Then, place rocks and sticks in the puddle so butterflies can perch while drinking.

Raised-bed Butterfly Garden

A raised-bed garden is very simple, created with a small area of soil bordered by boards, stones, rocks or bricks. You'll find it uses less space and less fertilizer and water.

Your garden can be any size and it's fun planning the design and materials you want to use.

- Start by using a shovel to cut through the grass around the perimeter of the bed. Then remove all grass and weeds in the center.
- Add some potting soil, compost or shredded leaves into the loose ground.

To create the boarder, select materials you find the most appealing.

• Wood: Cedar or redwood lumber (rot-resistant), treated landscape timber, or 2" x



10" or 2" x 12" boards (cut to desired length).

• Rocks, stones, bricks, concrete blocks, or decorative concrete stones. You can find rocks in your yard, the park, beach or woods (but, don't scavenge your neighbor's yard!).

When the border is finished and soil mixed, the fun of planting begins!

Get your garden tools ready!

First, plan the placement of your chosen plants. Plants that are taller belong in the back, medium height in the middle and short plants in the front. This keeps the butterflies happy (don't forget to place your puddle "watering holes" throughout the bed.

Butterflies are very picky when it comes to the kind of plants they like. If you local nursery doesn't carry some of the plants, ask them if they can be ordered or try an online retailer. Select a variety of plants to attract many different species.

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Some tips:

- Stagger wild and cultivated plants.
- Select plants that bloom in different times of the year.
- Plant in groups, which will be more desirable to the butterflies.

The chart below offers a variety of plants for butterflies to feed (nectar plants)



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and to lay their eggs on (larval plants). Have fun planting your garden and enjoy the beautiful butterflies it attracts!
